

Providing Patients with the Latest Breakthroughs in Research

GENE MUTATIONS LINKED TO WORSE LEUKEMIA OUTCOMES IN HISPANIC AND LATINO CHILDREN; A NEW DRUG COMBO MAY HELP TO ADDRESS THE DISPARITY

A combination of genetic mutations may explain the higher incidence of and poorer outcomes from pediatric leukemia in Hispanic and Latino children, according to Penn State College of Medicine researchers. A novel therapeutic drug combination — as well as testing for these mutations — may help address the disparity.

Hispanic and Latino children are between 1.2 and 1.75 times more likely to develop B-cell acute lymphoblastic leukemia (B-ALL), the most common childhood cancer, than non-Hispanic and non-Latino children. They also have a 40% higher death rate than their counterparts after correcting for socio-economic factors. Dr. Sinisa Dovat, a Four Diamonds funded researcher and pediatric oncologist at Penn State Health Children's Hospital and Penn State Cancer Institute, partnered with Dr. Gordana Raca of Children's Hospital Los Angeles and Dr. Kimberly J. Payne of Loma Linda University to understand the biology behind this health disparity after prior research suggested that there may be an increased

frequency of a type of genetic mutation in Hispanic and Latino children with B-ALL.

The researchers developed a combination therapy, which proved more effective against leukemia than either drug individually. These studies, published in *Leukemia*, laid the groundwork for a Phase I clinical trial with this treatment and provided a new paradigm for similar approaches to treat cancer using dual targeted treatments.

"We've identified a new approach for treating high-risk B-cell acute lymphoblastic leukemia," Dr. Dovat said. "Our work established the foundation for clinical testing of a new combination therapy that may address health disparities and benefit patients who suffer from pediatric leukemia."

WHITE BLOOD CELLS MAY CAUSE TUMOR CELL DEATH - BUT THAT'S NOT NECESSARILY A GOOD THING

White blood cells are part of many immune system responses in the human body. New research shows that a specific type of those cells may cause brain cancer tissues to die – but that's not good news, according to researchers at Penn State College of Medicine and Penn State Health Children's Hospital. Higher amounts of this tissue death have been associated with poor survival in patients with aggressive glioblastomas, a deadly type of brain cancer.

Dr. Wei Li, a Four Diamonds funded researcher and assistant professor of pediatrics and biochemistry and molecular biology, studied the causes of this tissue death called necrosis. Scientists have suggested that a lack of oxygen due to poor blood supply from rapid tumor growth may cause necrosis, but Dr. Li and a team of researchers investigated the molecular processes that cause this tissue death to occur. Their findings were published in *Nature Communications*.





UNITING OUR COMMUNITIES IN THE FIGHT AGAINST CHILDHOOD CANCER

Tens of thousands of students across Pennsylvania and in surrounding states have joined Four Diamonds to conquer child-hood cancer by participating in Mini-THONs. Despite the changes the COVID-19 pandemic caused in K-12 education, which led to the cancellation of many Mini-THON events, 161 schools found creative ways for their student leaders and volunteers to continue their Mini-THON activities. Mini-THON collectively raised \$2,832,826.81 for Four Diamonds at Penn State Health Children's Hospital during the 2020-21 school year to support families like Riley's. Since its inception in 1993, the Mini-THON program has cumulatively raised more than \$52 million to help conquer childhood cancer.


LEARN HOW SOFI MADE A DIFFERENCE FTK®
